A STITCH IN TIME

Did you know that Hillwood currently has 265 active volunteers? During 2013, volunteers graciously contributed over 20,000 hours working in an assortment of roles such as Floral Design Volunteer, Mansion or Garden Docent, Visitor Services Volunteer, and Library Support. In total, there are now 14 different volunteer positions at Hillwood.

Howard V. Kurtz, Associate Textile and Costume Curator, oversees approximately 5,000 textile items in the Hillwood Collection. In the Fall of 2013, Howard worked with Lisa Leyh, Interpretation Volunteer Manager, to create a new volunteer position which they titled "Collections Volunteer." Celia Steingold, a skilled "stitcher", was asked to fill this new role. Celia is no stranger to Hillwood. She has served as a mansion docent since 2000, giving tours in both English and French. Having previously mentioned her love of sewing to Lisa Leyh, Celia was asked if she would be interested in assisting Howard in the textile lab for a few hours each week.

The original project involved sewing accession numbers into garments. Working four hours each Friday, it took several months to sew numbers into the 182 garments that make up Hillwood's dress collection. Once that task was completed, Celia moved on to labeling dress accessories and linens. Celia recalled, "Both of these exercises were particularly interesting to me because I was able to see and study the extraordinary workmanship of the dressmakers who made all of Marjorie Post's clothes and which now form this extraordinary dress collection. I've been a lifetime sewer and am particularly interested in the fashion of the 1920's and 30's. Being able to examine these garments carefully has been a thrill for me." Howard has enjoyed working with Celia and noted that she is one of only a handful of people who have been allowed to see these textiles inside and out. He stated, "Who but us gets to see the inside of these incredibly detailed, designed and constructed evening gowns from so many different time periods?"

According to Howard, new projects appear for Celia on a weekly basis. Under Howard's instruction, Celia has recreated the 1920's headdresses for the Cartier exhibition, contributed her sewing talents to the new Staff Dining Room, helped build mounts for the Russian Sacred Arts Gallery, and made minor repairs to the fancy dress costumes traveling exhibition *Invitation to the Ball*. She has also worked on incoming gifts of lace, linens, tablecloths and napkins that have been given by outside donors.

Celia's most recent efforts have been in support of the upcoming exhibition, *Ingenue to Icon*, which opens to the public in June, 2015. She assisted Howard in preparing dresses to be photographed for the accompanying book, *Ingenue to Icon*, 70 Years of Fashion on the Marjorie Merriweather Post Collection. This assignment was particularly intense as they

had less than a month to steam the garments and dress the mannequins. Some items required repair and replacement of missing pieces. Celia said of the experience, "It amazes me how long it takes to dress one of the mannequins. It's so time consuming, and actually very physical work as well." Howard agreed stating, "It takes a full day to dress two mannequins."

During this past year, Celia contributed 130 volunteer hours as the new Collections Volunteer. Summing up her new experience Celia said," I really like the variety of what I get to do. Every Friday has new surprises. I like tedious tasks and I'm very goal-oriented, so completing the sewing tasks I'm given is very satisfying for me. The most exciting aspect of working with Marjorie Post's garments and textiles is channeling her spirit. Volunteering in the lab has added immeasurably to my Hillwood volunteer experience. And Howard is an exceptional teacher who has taught me many tricks of the trade. Who knew I'd ever make rabbit pom-poms to replace those on Marjorie Post's 1920's fancy dress American Indian costume?"

According to Howard, "Hillwood's Costume and Textiles collection has historical value that must be maintained. We are constantly placing pieces on exhibition and that requires upkeep for the objects. I've appreciated the assistance I've received from Celia this past year and look forward to working with her on future exhibitions. Thank you, Celia, for your assistance this past year, and Happy One Year Anniversary!"

A CARTIER CHRISTMAS

The Holidays this year at Hillwood will glitter brightly with the glamour and elegance of Marjorie Post. The special exhibition *Cartier: Marjorie Merriweather Post's Dazzling Gems* serves as the unique inspiration for various Christmas trees throughout the estate.

Beginning on Tuesday, November 25, you'll be greeted in the Visitor Center by a 12' tall tree decorated in silver and sapphire blue colored ornaments paying homage to Marjorie's iconic sapphire and diamond necklace. The Mansion Entry Hall will glow with a Christmas tree glittering in rich emerald tones inspired by Post's famous Cartier pendant brooch. A grand tree dripping with strands of pearls and diamond

pendants sits in splendor in the period French Drawing Room, mimicking the glamourous clasp created by Cartier for Marjorie to wear with her sophisticated sets of pearls. In the Pavilion, turquoise and amethyst gemstones complement the lush lilac velvet wall coverings of the room. The tree in Post's personal dressing room takes on hues of aquamarine, inspired by a 1950's brooch. And of course Hillwood's festive traditions will still be kept with the famous kissing ball hanging in the Mansion Entry Hall.

In addition to the trees, colorful dining services also inspired by Cartier will be featured on the Dining and Breakfast Room tables. In the Dining Room, a table set with Sèvres porcelain in the famous bleu celeste (heavenly blue) takes its inspiration from turquoise jewelry seen in the Cartier exhibition. The deep blue sapphire of special glassware and intense cobalt blue of Russian plates saturate the Breakfast Room table with the splendid jewel tones on display. Christmas inspired floral arrangements will be displayed in the mirrored alcoves of the Breakfast Room and set in two ornate silver vases from Marjorie's collection. Poinsettias and orchids will cap off the Holiday displays throughout the Mansion.

ARCHIVES & SPECIAL COLLECTIONS NEWS

Over the last few years, the Archives & Special Collections Department has been working to digitize a series of home movies from the Marjorie Merriweather Post Collection. The home movies span many decades, from the 1930s to the 1960s, and help bring to life the different facets of Post and her family. The films depict travel footage from various overseas trips and voyages on the Sea Cloud. Personal moments such as Adelaide Brevoort Hutton's wedding in 1927 are also captured. The home movies are rich in footage of Post's various residences, including exterior, interior, and garden scenes of Hillwood. It is hoped that the digitization of the films will make them more accessible and easily disseminated. A web exhibition is being created using tools provided by the Google Art Project to highlight some of the films. There & Back: Travel Films from the Hillwood Archives & Special Collections features travel footage of Post and her family to locales such as the Caribbean, Austria, Russia, England, France, Texas, & Camp Topridge. A direct link will be distributed when completed, so be sure to keep an eye out! In addition to making these films accessible in the web exhibition, eligible films will be uploaded to the Hillwood Estate, Museum and Gardens official YouTube channel over the coming months.

And while visiting the new web exhibition, check out Hillwood on the Google Art Project! Hillwood has been a contributing Google Art Project partner since 2012. Google Art Project, a service of Google Cultural Institute, provides a space on Google's platform for Hillwood and other cultural heritage institutions to showcase items from their digital collections. The Hillwood Google Art Project profile currently hosts over 50 images, each representative of an item in the Hillwood collections, including the Twelve Monogram Egg, the Catherine the Great Easter Egg, and the Nuptial Crown. In addition to hosting Hillwood digital images and Hillwoodcreated web exhibitions, Hillwood has worked with Google to create an ultra-high resolution gigapixel image (consisting of about 7 billion pixels) of Konstantin Makovsky's A Boyar Wedding Feast, in addition to an interactive virtual "Museum-View" tour of the Hillwood Mansion. CW POST COURTYARD UPDATE

The courtyard renovation project is moving along; although there have been several unexpected complications that have put the completion date in question. We discovered a buried tank that required special permitting and oversight for removal; and some of the new storm water lines were not installed properly and will have to be dug up and reinstalled. We needed to install a new storm water pipe across the main road near the Greenhouse, because a pipe that was on drawings turned out not to be where it was expected. A multitude of hidden utilities have been discovered under the asphalt. We are documenting everything that is found and all of the new pipes that are

being laid so that future projects will have accurate records of what is under the ground.

The framework of the tent will go up as part of the project, and the skin will be installed sometime in the spring, depending on the weather. The next phase of the project will be installing the foundations and reinstalling the storm water drains in the courtyard. This will result in routing visitors and staff on different pathways leading into the Café, CW Post, Merriweather conference rooms and the Administration building. Staff in Facilities, Visitor Services, and Security and the contractor will work to make sure that the paths into the affected buildings are safe and easily navigated. Once the foundation work is completed, the final push to install the paving and tent frame will begin.

This is an exciting but difficult time as we move through the phases of the project. Many thanks to one and all for their patience and help!

HEAVILY BERRIED VIBURNUMS BRIGHTEN LUNAR LAWN BEDS

Clusters of bright red berries hanging from shrubs on both sides of the Lunar Lawn signal the locations of *Viburnum setigerum*, the tea viburnum. This lesser known viburnum is one of the most

desirable viburnums for berry display. And although it is deciduous, at this season it retains most of its leaves; they may turn a muted red, making an even more rewarding sight. Look for the two groups of tea viburnums within the Lunar Lawn shrub beds on either side of the Japanese-Style Garden overlook.

In spring and summer, the veined leaves are bluish-green, looking slightly lighter on the undersides. They are three to six inches long and up to two and a half inches wide, with a rounded lance shape (ovate-lanceolate). As on all viburnums, the leaves are opposite. In the spring, white, flat-topped clusters of flowers, or cymes, about two inches wide, open as the leaves emerge.

The shrub is multi-stemmed, with an upright, open shape, and grows 8 to 12 feet tall. When the branches are weighted with berries, they may arch downward, giving the shrub a graceful, nodding appearance. However, the berries will not last forever, as birds feed on them.

The tea viburnum is native to central and western China and was introduced into this country in 1901. As the name suggests, it has been used to brew tea, but there seems to be little information on where or why. Some references suggest that monks of the ancient Buddhist center on Mount Emei in China's Sichuan Province used it to make tea for pilgrims to their site.

Viburnum setigerum will grow in full sun to moderate shade, in well-drained soil. The tea viburnums in the Lunar Lawn shrub borders were planted during the lawn's renovation in the spring of 2013 and are now about six feet tall. However, the shrub is not new to Hillwood—one planted in Mrs. Post's time is located just beyond the east Armillary Sphere.

JAPANESE-STYLE GARDEN WATER

When strolling through the Japanese-Style Garden, you may notice that the water sparkles just a little more than it used to. That's no illusion. That's our new filtration system. Our old system was comprised of two tanks filled with clay beads that collected debris. When they were full, the system would perform a series of backwashes to rinse it all out of the tanks.

This year we got to a point where it just wouldn't rinse clean anymore or remove the debris from the water, so we upgraded. In August, our plumbing contractors, Harry Hottel, installed a system that has removable, cleanable filters with 840sqft of filtration area (up from 10sqft in the old system) and can filter particles down to 20 microns. The unknown factor was how often they would have to be cleaned. So far, we've only had

to clean the filters once in 3 months. When you get a chance, come on down and enjoy the water.
