# **Recap of Recent Circles Trips**

In building the original Lotos Club in 1907, architect Donn Berber remarked, "We are developing American architecture right here, but we are too busy to stop and proclaim the style." Circles members have explored this American, pluralistic style with two exclusive Circles trips to Baltimore and New York City.

On March 28, a group of twenty travelers was joined by Kate Markert, Hillwood executive director, Dr. Wilfried Zeisler, chief curator, and Lizzie Axelson, membership operations and marketing manager, on a day trip to Baltimore. Travelers enjoyed a curator-led tour of Fabergé and the Russian Crafts Tradition: An Empire's Legacy at the Walters Art Museum, learning the historical and artistic context of the firm of Fabergé. Jim Abbott, Evergreen Museum and Library director and curator, then invited the travelers to explore the Gilded Age mansion surrounded by Italian-style gardens.

From June 12 to 13, twenty-six travelers visited New York City to explore more American art and architecture and how they reflect international influences. The group, led by Kate Markert, Wilfried Zeisler, and Jan Jensen, senior development officer, enjoyed a wonderful trip, which included a curator-led tour of *Versailles: A Royal Destination* at The Metropolitan Museum of Art, a director-led tour of The Frick Collection, and a private dinner at the historic Lotos Club. The highlight of the trip was a champagne toast hosted by Elizabeth and Patrick Gerschel, current owners of the largest of the six apartments created out of Marjorie Merriweather Post's

original three story, 54-room penthouse at 1107 Fifth Avenue. Travelers were also treated to special tours of A La Vieille Russie and jewelers Verdura and Belperron, deepening their knowledge of the fine jewelry favored by Marjorie Post.

All of the books housed in the mansion volunteer lounge library have been barcoded and the catalogue updated. An inventory also occurred to withdraw books in poor condition, duplicate copies, and non-academic and fictitious works. These withdrawn books are labeled as such and organized in the boxes under the desk by the window in the lounge. You are welcome to take what you would like from these boxes, making sure the book has a "withdrawn" stamp on its back pocket and card. We will continue to cultivate the volunteer library with topics also represented in Hillwood's main library: eighteenth- and nineteenth-century French decorative arts, imperial Russian arts, gardening, volunteering, pertinent biographies, and more.

We will inform you if we will accept it into our library. We will not accept Hillwood publications as we purchase copies of these specifically for the libraries. Alternative places to consider donating your gently used books include local public libraries and other museums of similar content. This is a great way to not only repurpose books but also spread the word about Hillwood!

We also plan to install a barcode scanner to update the self-checkout process of library books. We know many of you utilize these available resources to continue your education of the collection, Hillwood, and Marjorie Merriweather Post, and we are thrilled to be modernizing the checkout process. This new system will send e-mail reminders of due dates automatically and allows you to search the volunteer library collection. To checkout or search for resources in the volunteer library, please follow the steps posted on the board above the laptop by the window. Please note this checkout system is on the honor system. If you have resources that belong to the volunteer library, please return them to Lisa Horvath as soon as possible, so they can be catalogued into the system. Her office is located on the second floor of the mansion by the side stairs.

# "I Met Marjorie Post": Hillwood's Oral History Program

A visitor walks up to you and says, "I just have to tell you, I met Marjorie Post in the late 1960s, this is my first time back here since then." They have been enjoying the mansion and gardens for much of the day, but decided to share their personal connection to Hillwood with you.

You are giving a tour with a very lively and responsive group, and while standing in the mansion, someone on your tour reveals to the group they had dined at Hillwood as a guest of Marjorie Post.

At the tour desk, the first person in line tells you their whole connection to Marjorie Post, even before they can clip on a colorful "fabulous" visitor tag.

The oral history program captures essential information about the history of the estate and Marjorie Post. The early oral history interviews with the household staff recorded how Marjorie ran Hillwood, making the publication *Living Artfully* possible. Today, most of our interviewees identify themselves when visiting Hillwood, often on their first return trip after several decades. Recent interviewees include those who visited Hillwood as student guests of Marjorie from Long Island University or Mount Vernon Seminary.


Those who interacted with Marjorie first-hand are of interest to the oral history program. Accounts do not need to be lengthy, as interviews range from four to forty minutes but are best if from their own first-hand encounters with Marjorie or key Hillwood staff members during her lifetime, such as butler Gus Modig or curator Marvin Ross. If you meet a guest that has a first-hand encounter with Marjorie Post or key Hillwood staff members, please encourage them to stop by the tour desk where staff will take their contact information and Hillwood connection to pass along to Estella Chung, director of collections. Visitors can also pick up Estella's business card at the tour desk if they would prefer to reach out to her directly. Interviews are usually conducted by phone. Volunteers have had a large impact on the oral history program, and all of the resulting exhibitions and programs that draw upon these recollections of Hillwood and Marjorie Post.

## **New Library Resource: Berg Fashion Library**

The Hillwood Special Collections Library is pleased to announce the acquisition of the online reference database, Berg Fashion Library. This database is dedicated to dress and fashion across cultures and throughout history from the ancient world to present day. It contains images of apparel and accessories, the Berg Encyclopedia of World Dress and Fashion eBooks, an interactive timeline of fashion history, and much more.

We are especially excited about the image galleries containing over 13,000 images of apparel and accessories. Well-known museums with fashion collections such as The Museum at Fashion Institute of Technology, The Metropolitan Museum of Art, the Victoria and Albert Museum, and the Philadelphia Museum of Art contribute to these galleries. There are also images from smaller museums such as The Valentine in Richmond, Virginia. This feature allows researchers to view

similar items from multiple institutions through one platform rather than searching the online collections of individual museums. There is also a small but growing exhibition archive, which presents exclusive information and images from various museum exhibitions featuring fashion and accessories.

There are multiple ways to browse or to search for content on Berg Fashion Library. An introductory video detailing these options as well as the many features of the database can be

found <u>here</u>. New content to the database is added regularly, so be sure to check often! You may also create an account, which will allow you to save and organize content.


## New Fabergé Rediscovered Audio Tour

Visitors can now delve deeper into the new discoveries of Hillwood's collection of Fabergé pieces with the Fabergé Rediscovered exhibition audio tour, available for download as part of the Hillwood Museum & Gardens Tour mobile app for iOS and Android devices. It is also available on the audio guides distributed at the visitor center.

When touring in the Adirondack building, visitors can look for a headphones symbol ( $\bigcirc$ ) and a number beside selected works and on labels. They can then enter the number on their player and press "play" or select that object from the list on the mobile app.

Once the exhibition closes, some of the objects will return to the mansion for display. At that time, most of the exhibition audio tour stops will then be re-purposed and added to the permanent collection audio tour to continue educating visitors long after the exhibition.

We are continuing to recruit for the 2019 garden docent training program and visitor services volunteers ("VSVs"). Applications and position descriptions for both volunteer roles are available on the <u>lobs and Volunteering page</u> of Hillwood's website.

Garden docents lead seasonal, one-hour tours of Hillwood's formal gardens. Tour seasons run April through June and September through mid-November. The training, consisting of weekly evening classes, readings, and projects, will take place January through May 2019. Through the training, docents learn how to engage visitors about Hillwood's gardens, landscape design, and Marjorie Merriweather Post.

VSVs serve several important roles in assuring positive and enjoyable visitor experiences at Hillwood. Some VSV

# Plant Profile: Bluebeard, Blue Spirea, or Blue Mist Shrub (Caryopteris x clandonensis)

Near the end of summer, the blooms on most shrubs have faded. This is when *Caryopteris* takes over to carry the garden for the next couple of months. It flowers with a spectacular display of deep blue to violet flowers that attract bees, butterflies, and hummingbirds and give them a boost for their fall journeys elsewhere or their winter preparations. Because of its relatively small size, usually two to four feet high and wide, *Caryopteris* is often seen near the front of garden beds, where it is frequently confused with perennials.

Technically, Blue Spirea is a sub-shrub. It has woody stems at the base and is root hardy to about the United States Department of Agriculture Zone 5, but the growth above is not hardy in colder climates. If pruned back in the spring, it comes back to life as flowers are produced on new wood.

Small, lance-shaped, light greygreen leaves contrast beautifully with the lightly fragrant flowers, and the shrub is a real show stopper in August and September.

Native to the Himalayas and East Asia, it's a cross between *C. incana* and *C. mongholica*. It is easy to grow, resistant to deer and rabbits, drought and heat tolerant, with few insect or disease problems. Its name comes from the Greek word, *karyon*, meaning nut, and *pteron*, meaning wing,

which refer to the winged fruits produced after flowering.

Best of all, there are many cultivars, giving the gardener a great choice of sizes and colors. One of the most popular is 'Longwood Blue', with profuse, violet-blue flowers that can be found at Longwood Gardens in Pennsylvania as well as here at Hillwood in the cutting garden. 'Arthur Simmonds' has bright blue flowers, and 'Blue Mist' has powder-blue flowers. The foliage on both produce a scent when brushed with a hand. 'Minibleu' is more compact, just two-and-a-half feet high and wide, and is noted for its dark blue flowers and glossy dark green foliage.

For something a little different, more adventurous gardeners may consider 'Worcester Gold' with golden leaves and light lavender-blue flowers, or 'Lisaura', which is sold under the trade name Hint of Gold and has bright golden leaves with mint-green margins and dark blue blooms.

There are many other *Caryopteris* cultivars and likely many more to come, making this shrub so appealing to gardeners.


## What's Coming Up in the Gardens

To start, a huge thank you to all our volunteers who helped with the spring and summer planting. You have been amazing! First, you planted nearly seven thousand spring annuals to go along with our bulb show. Then you turned around a month and a half later and planted nearly ten thousand summer annuals and tropicals for the summer display. Mix in all the perennials and shrubs, the impact you have had on the gardens has been amazing. Bravo!

In other news, our irrigation project is moving right along. Nature Unlimited, our irrigation contractor, is putting the final touches on the upgrade to our sprinkler system. Their redesign in the cutting garden has taken us from three watering zones to sixteen, allowing for more efficient water use in that area. The new controller boxes have also been installed, and it is just a matter of days until everything will be running by the click of a cell phone.

For those who have been wondering about the compost tea endeavor—that too is up and running. Our new pet red wigglers (*Eisenia foetida* for our Latin enthusiasts) are breaking down organic matter into fine looking, fungi rich compost. This compost is then steeped in oxygenated water for twenty-four hours and sprayed onto the plants. The theory is to populate the leaves with good fungi and not leave room for the bad. We are using this season as a test run with better analysis to come in subsequent years.

The cutting garden wall project will commence this month. Our hardscape contractor John Pond does excellent work and is in high demand, but he and his crew will be here to tackle the areas of missing stones and crumbling mortar. We will keep you informed of his timeline and how it will affect the campus.

Finally, we will use some of summer to get into our wooded areas. Last year, the staff did a great job of cutting the English ivy from the perimeter trees around the formal gardens and up to our fence line. English ivy only produces seed on mature foliage growing on a vertical surface, so this at least has reduced seedling development. This year, we will be digging out a large swath of the ivy from the woodland trail to the lower gate. Removing the ivy will allow for a more natural forest succession and lead to a healthier ecosystem.

College and a Master of Arts degree in museum studies with a concentration in Collections Management from The George Washington University.







# **Museum Attendants Join Hillwood's Seasonal Staff**
