VOLUNTEER SURVEY: RETURN TO ON-SITE SERVICE

With restrictions lifting, staff has been working on a timeline to bring volunteers back to their on-site roles at Hillwood. To aid in our planning, we would like to take this opportunity to capture your concerns regarding on-site roles, availability for service, and expectations for returning once it is safe to do so.

Please take a few minutes to complete this short survey. The survey closes on July 6. Staff will be in touch in July with the survey results and next steps for volunteer service. Please note Hillwood's volunteer operations currently remain limited.

EXPANDING CAPACITY

In light of the new CDC findings regarding the efficacy of vaccines and with the great majority of Hillwood staff fully vaccinated, Hillwood is pleased to share we are moving into the next phase of our recovery plan as of June 12, 2021. This next phase includes increasing capacity for the visitor experience and staffing the visitor center with staff and a small pilot team of visitor services volunteers.

In accordance with the latest D.C. Mayoral Order, Hillwood will return to our normal (pre-COVID) capacity limits for on-site visits:

- Starting June 12, Hillwood will no longer require advanced, timed-entry reservations.
- Day-of, in-person ticketing will be available in the visitor center in addition to advance reservations. Visitors can arrive to Hillwood any time during regular operating hours.
- The capacity restrictions for indoor spaces, such as the mansion and special exhibitions, will be lifted.
- All visitors must check-in with the staff at the front desk in the visitor center.
- A small pilot team of VSVs will be scheduled for shortened two-hour shifts in the visitor center to help support the visitor experience.

This is an exciting step towards normalcy and we are eager to learn from the pilot team how best to support additional roles across campus.

Roaring Twenties: The Life and Style of Marjorie Merriweather Post

Opening June 12, 2021

Explore the Jazz Age through the lens of an icon. Hillwood founder Marjorie Merriweather Post was a prominent tastemaker during the era known as the Roaring Twenties. One hundred years later, Hillwood celebrates Post's effect on the period—her impeccable attire, impressive art collection, and sumptuous design that made her one of the most influential women of the 1920s. This was a seminal decade for Post, as she developed into the icon we know her as today—a collector, philanthropist, humanitarian, and businesswoman, determined to do good and use her means to benefit others. The decorative objects and glamorous gowns on display in this exhibition reveal a legendary lifestyle and the range of art and style that embodied the essence of the Roaring Twenties. From globally influenced pieces to her splendid apparel for events and philanthropic fundraisers to her residences and furnishings, these items from Post's incredible life will demonstrate the allure, excitement, and international nature of this remarkable decade.

Kristine Mays: Rich Soil Opening June 26, 2021

Hillwood is thrilled to welcome *Kristine Mays: Rich Soil*, opening in the gardens at Hillwood on June 26, 2021. Mays breathes life into wire, transforming an industrial product into fascinating and moving works of art. Springing to life throughout the 13 acres of formal gardens, 29 life-size, three dimensional sculptures will surprise visitors as they dance in the garden beds, bursting forth from the plant life. Marjorie Post maintained a lifelong love of dance, often hosting dances at Hillwood and remaining a dedicated patron of ballet organizations. It is fitting that *Rich Soil* finds a home at Hillwood, continuing this connection to bodily movement and expression. Mays's work explores the dance between life and death, as the pieces interact with the land and capture the gesture of the human form. Explore these figures as they transform the grounds for the second ever installation of art in the gardens.

BENTLEY PROJECT UPDATE: DIGITIZING THE POST FAMILY PAPERS

In fall 2020, Hillwood's Archives and Special Collections launched a new phase of one of our Digital Initiatives projects – the Bentley Project – as a remote volunteer opportunity. Inspired by projects like the National Archives' "Citizen Archivist" and the Smithsonian's Transcription Center, remote metadata volunteers (RMVs) have assisted with the transcription and cataloging of digitized copies of The Post Family Papers, specifically Marjorie Merriweather Post's series. The collection is originally held by the Bentley Historical Library at the University of Michigan, but is being digitized by Hillwood to more easily facilitate our own research into our collections and founder.
