HILLWOOD'S GRAND PIANOS

Earlier this year, a specialist from Steinway & Sons conserved and tuned Marjorie Post's two grand pianos in the Pavilion and French drawing room. Pianos have been a key piece of furnishing in the homes of the elite in the nineteenth century Western Society. Hillwood's pianos were originally bought for the Burden Mansion, Marjorie Post's residence from 1915-1925, and followed Post in most of her homes until she settled in Washington, D.C.

FILMS OF RICH SOIL-INSPIRED DANCE IN THE GARDENS

The site-specific dance Hillwood and Dance Place co-commissioned is now available on Hillwood's YouTube as both a 2-minute trailer and a complete film (40 minutes). The performance, titled *Ceremony*, was inspired by *Kristine Mays: Rich Soil* and the work traversed Hillwood's gardens with five unique dances specific to the sculptures and setting of each garden. The performance engaged nearly 500 patrons when it premiered at Hillwood July 21-25. You can also revisit the 34-minute video of *Beauty*, which the Dance Institute of Washington performed on the Lunar Lawn stage for 125 visitors on August 25. We are delighted to keep engaging with these temporal works into the future.

HILLWOOD'S INFECTIOUS DISEASE SAFETY GUIDELINES

Wearing a Mask

If you need to cancel a scheduled shift, please notify your direct supervisor. Volunteers who report to Hillwood ill will be sent home to rest and recovery in accordance with these health guidelines.
