Mansion Display Changes: Russian Porcelain Room, Second-Floor Hallway, and Pavilion

On Tuesday, July 9, and Friday, July 11, the Collections and Curatorial team refreshed the porcelain displays in the Russian porcelain room, the second-floor hallway, and the pavilion. These updates highlight long-term loans from the collection of Kathy Durdin, along with select objects from Hillwood's own storage.
