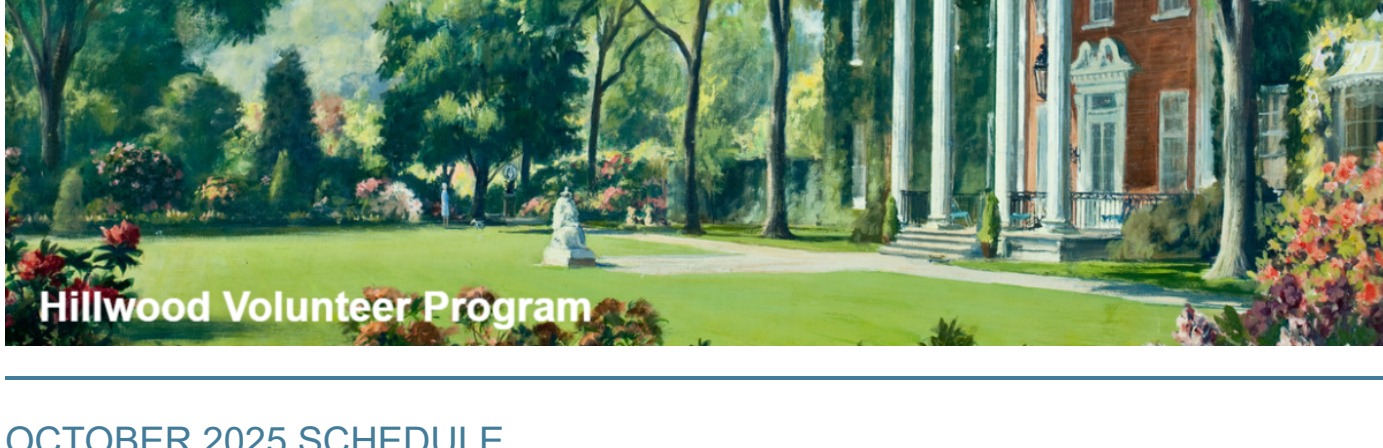




OCTOBER 2025 SCHEDULE

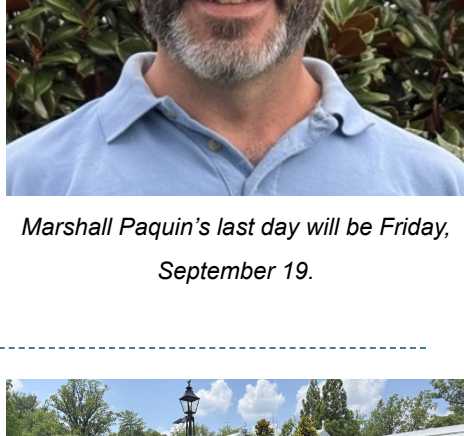

A Fond Farewell to Marshall Paquin

It is bittersweet to announce that Marshall Paquin, senior garden section manager, has accepted a new opportunity with Loudoun County Parks, Recreation & Community Services and will be leaving Hillwood. Marshall dedicated the last nineteen years to the care of the gardens while mentoring and supporting the horticulture staff. During his time here, Marshall set the example for focusing on individual plant health care as the key to successful gardening and for his willingness to lend a hand on any project. We cannot thank Marshall enough and we wish him the best on his new adventure. His last day will be Friday, September 19.

Equipment Upgrade

The horticulture department received an equipment upgrade this summer. Visitors will now see a Polaris Pro XD Kinetic UTV aiding the staff in the maintenance of the gardens. It is electric, getting 45 miles to the charge, and can tow 2,500 lbs, which is important for bringing compost up from the access road. The new vehicle will help to replace the dwindling fleet of 20+ year old diesel tractors that have seen a lot of hard use over their lifespan.

Stickers in the Mansion

Have you ever seen a sticker, or label, on an object in the mansion and wondered why it was there? Wilfried Zeisler, deputy director and chief curator, shared that there are currently a number of objects on loan and in Hillwood's collection where labels are visible and can tell a lot about the objects themselves.

Labels, old or new, are very important parts of an object's history. They often bring significant information like the provenance, or previous ownership, of an artwork. On the image to the right, an auction sticker from the sale the piece came from can be seen on the interior of a salt dish in the Russian porcelain room. The curatorial team aims to keep labels intact, especially if they are not too visible and when the adhesive is not an issue for the piece or the material.

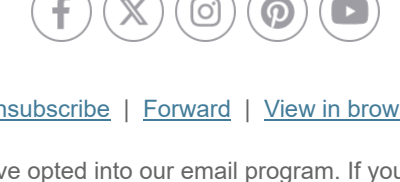
